Why the ACT Is Overrated.

Why the ACT Is Overrated

And Why the SAT May Be Better for You

As a student who has taken the ACT six times, I can complain about the ACT. I have spent over 24 hours of my life taking this test. You might think I would be a professional by now, nearing a perfect score. That is where you are wrong.

Although I have taken the ACT six times, my score has only increased three points. A three-point increase over three years. I can assure you that the mantra "practice makes perfect" does not apply to the ACT. Trust me, I studied too. Prior to my most recent ACT, I had spent over 40 hours in prep-courses for the test. After losing a point from my highest score on test number six, I gave up. In a whim, however, I decided my last shot would be on the SAT. After my experience, I wish I would have only ever taken the SAT and here is why.

There isn't a science portion.

I know a lot of people who absolutely despise the science section of the ACT, even though they love science. Quite frankly, the science portion isn't science. It is more or less reading with data analysis. The questions are specifically made to trick you as well, as if reading an entire experiment and analyzing data in 40 minutes isn't cumbersome enough.

You have more time.

For the reading portion of the SAT, you have 75 seconds to answer one question. The ACT, you only have about 52 seconds. A twenty-three second window makes a difference when you are searching for answers in a reading passage. In the English portion of the ACT, you have 36 seconds for each question, while the SAT allots about 47 seconds. When I had taken the ACT, I was always desperate for time during the end of both these sections of the test, but I actually finished *early* on both of these sections with about five minutes to spare.

The eastern states will appreciate it.

Majority of schools are accepting of either standardized test; however, you will find that coastal and eastern states prefer the SAT scores. These states also encourage SAT subject tests for areas you might want to go into.

The math is pretty darn simple.

Although there are two math portions on the SAT (one with and without calculator), the questions they ask aren't anything above algebra II level. Even the hardest concept questions do not require detailed and incredulous calculations beyond normal day math.

With the SAT, I felt better prepared to succeed. With more time and less tricks, I had never felt as confident leaving a testing center until the SAT. If the ACT is more your style, then all is good. I think it is important to bring up this underrated option for those that have sunk in the same boat as me.

Burma or Myanmar?

First, here is a quick summary and intro to Myanmar, also known as Burma. Burma was under the rule of an oppressive military regime from 1962 to 2011. The generals who ran the country stifled all argumentative opinions and were known for terrible human rights abuses. A gradual liberation started in 2010, leading to their first free election in 2015. In 2016, the new government led by veteran liberalization leader Aung San Suu Kyi was installed. Since 2017, Myanmar has



driven out more than 3/4ths of the Muslim Rohingya population to Bangladesh and India. It is currently being called "a textbook example of ethnic cleansing" by a United Nations report.

The name change

occurred during the regime of the military government in 1989 from Burma to Myanmar. Most of the global community agrees to recognize the name change. However, the United States and the United Kingdom, along with a small group of other countries, continue to use the Name Burma.

The United States and others usually argue that the name change was made without the consent of the people, therefore it is illegal. The military regime has said that Burma only refers to its largest ethnic group and not the other 134 ethnic communities. Burma, which became the country's official name under British colonial rule, was used as the primary language. Both terms have been used for centuries, Myanmar was the formal term used mostly in written communication.

Aung San Suu Kyi has stated several times that both names were acceptable but that she has a preference for the term



Burma. She has told foreign diplomatic corps that it did not matter whether her country was called Burma or Myanmar, because in the constitution it clearly states that the country is called the Republic of the Union of Myanmar.

About three years since her party's victory, the U.S. seems to not getting any closer to changing its policy on what to call the nation. In formal correspondence with the Naypyidaw government the United States uses Myanmar. (Naypyidaw is the capital city of Myanmar and the seat of the nation's government) But, the U.S. still publicly refers to the nation as Burma. Given the president's tolerance of Burma and the current tensions between the two countries over the Rohingya crisis, a decision by the U.S. to accept Myanmar seem unlikely.



Hispanic Heritage Month

Hispanics make up more than 17% of the total United States population. That's over 57 million Americans. Why do we celebrate Hispanic Heritage Month? Easy. There are many cultures, countries and languages that make up the broad term of Hispanic. It is a month to celebrate and highlight the accomplishments and influence of the Hispanic community in American culture. From September 15 through October 15 the United States celebrates; Puerto Ricans, Dominicans, Cubans, Mexicans, Salvadorians and more. It started as just a week under President Lyndon Johnson in 1968 and was expanded to 30 days by Ronald Reagan. It starts in the middle of September because the 15th is the anniversary of independence for five different Latin American countries; Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua. Mexico and Chile celebrate their independence days on September 16th and 18th. Hispanic Heritage month is to celebrate the beauty and the contribution they bring to our country. Most likely this issue will be out after the month is over, but that doesn't mean you can't celebrate and learn more about the Hispanic culture.

The rankings in this article make more sense based on other articles about good education systems around the world. The first thing the author states, is that neither the US or the UK made the top ten list. This statement does not agree with the first article, but half of the statement agrees with the last. This list is also based on the World Economic Forum's Global Competitiveness Report. There is a tie for ninth place by Japan, Barbados, and New Zealand. Eighth place was taken by Estonia, and sixth was a tie between Ireland and Qatar. The Netherlands was placed in fifth with Singapore taking fourth. There was a tie for second between Belgian and Switzerland, with Finland being ranked with the best education system in the world. What surprised me the most was the Barbados and Estonia are on the list. In the news, we rarely hear about those two countries, and yet they are said to have a better, much better even, educational system than the United States. Stating what the rating system is based on makes this article more reliable than the previous one, which is sad for the United States, since we are not on it.



Is There a Superior Candy on Halloween?





An elusive tree kangaroo was spotted for the first time in 90 years. An amateur botanist spotted the Wondiwoi tree kangaroo in the remote mountains of West Papua, New Guinea. THe Wondiwoi tree kangaroo proceeded to elude researchers for 90 years, to serve as a cause to fear for its extinction. Amateur botanist, Michael smith, met a member of the species while visiting the dense forestry of the Wondiwoi mountain range. 
The Lexington High School Drama Club Presents

The Colonization of the West Bank- Seth

When did colonization end? Some may say the 1940's to 1960's, during the famous "decolonization of Africa". By American standards, one can even argue 1776, the date Lady Liberty rained supreme. However even these dates are flawed, the famous American war for independence didn't end settlement, and the last nation to fully gain their independence in Africa, didn't do so until 1977. Still, small European enclaves survive in Africa, The Spanish holdings in Morocco, Melilla and Ceuta being prime examples. However, Israel take the top spot for having the most controversial settlement policies.

We've all heard of the Zionism and the desire for a sovereign Jewish state. However, to recap, in 1917 Great Britain would be the first to declare support (to arouse Jewish war support) for a native Jewish state; and they had a claim. Modern Israel had been the birthplace for the Jewish faith, with Jews having a cultural, spiritual and historic claim to the land. While Great Britain declared support for Zionism in 1917, it wouldn't be until 1948 that they received what they were promised. However, the same strip of land, was also promised to the native Muslim population. Therefore, the land was split, between Israel and Palestine. Palestine and the Native Muslim population were outraged, as they were promised a free Palestinian state in all of modern Israel-Palestine, but this, they saw as imperial colonization under a new name; it wouldn't be long before war broke out, with Israel quickly claiming victory.

Decades later, anger and violence still rain supreme, but now Israel claimed large portions of land previously promised to Palestine, creating an international crisis. The West Bank, being the heartland of the previous Palestinian government was now thrown into question. With U.S. intervention, in 1993 the Oslo Accords were signed, diving occupied Palestine (specifically the West Bank) into 3 sections. 18 percent of the land was

given to "Section A" where Palestine would hold full independent control. Section B would (22 percent of the West Bank) give Palestine primary control, with Israelis stationed military personnel, providing Israel with the ability to control the area if necessary. Section C (60 percent of the west bank) was given to Israel to do with as they pleased. This area controls most of the West Bank's agriculture, minerals, fresh water and roads, practically restricting Palestine from developing an independent economy.

This creates an interesting predicament in the region. Land previously owned by Native Palestinians now found themselves either partially or completely under Israel occupation, with very little Palestinian autonomy. Even in the areas dictated as independent Palestine (section A) most are surrounded by Israelis settlements, with gated community's. Some Palestinians are even forced to pass though checkpoints governed by Israel.

West Bank settlements are subsidized by the Israel government with one-thirds of housing subsidies being centered in the West bank. Billions of dollars have been poured into Israelis controlled west bank for school and parks, even housing mortgages are significantly lower than mainland Israel. Some settlers even come from around the world, either for the economic success of the settlements, or possible to help in the creation of
