What is College Credit Plus?



College Credit Plus is Ohio's dual credit program

- Students can earn high school and college credit at the same time
- Students enroll in college courses and adhere to the requirements of the college

Students in Grades 7 -12



- Must complete an assessment exam and be determined "eligible" for College Credit Plus
- May apply to any public college or participating private college
- May apply to multiple institutions
- Must be Ohio residents

Students in Grades 7 -12



- May choose from a variety of college-level courses (as determined by placement testing & course eligibility rules)
- Can earn credit to satisfy both high school and college requirements (One 3+ Credit Hour Course = One High School Unit)
- Must successfully complete the courses in order to earn the credit

Students in Grades 7 -12



- May take classes during the summer, fall, & spring semesters
- May take courses at the high school¹, college campus, or online

¹The option to take courses at the high school is only available if the high school has partnered with a college or university to offer college courses at the high school

How can students participate?



Step 1: Eligibility

Students must be "eligible" for College Credit Plus participation based on assessment exam scores

Student Eligibility Assessment Exams



- Students' scores must show that they are ready for "college-level" courses in at least one subject area on an exam such as ACT, SAT, Accuplacer, ALEKS, PlaceU, or MapleSoft
- Each college/university may have different exam requirements

Student Eligibility Assessment Exams



- Colleges and universities will review students' scores using statewide standards
- If a student's scores are not "college-level," other conditions may be considered depending on the exam scores and if the student has:
 - Overall high school GPA of at least3.0 or
 - Recommendation form/letter (from school counselor, principal, or career-technical advisor)

How can students participate?



Step 2: College Admission

- Students must apply for admission
- Contact the college to learn about their requirements, processes, paperwork, and deadlines
- Colleges have the final decision on student admission

How can students participate?



Step 3: Course Registration

If the student is considered eligible and has been admitted to the college, then the college will discuss course options with the student, based on assessment scores, prerequisites, and other requirements.

What courses can a student take?



CCP courses can satisfy high school graduation requirements

- School counselors can help students understand graduation requirements and CCP course substitutions
- Some high schools have more requirements for graduation than the state minimum

What courses can a student take?



College advisors will help students know which courses they can take, based on:

- Assessment scores
- Course prerequisites
- Course eligibility rules

Course Eligibility Rules



Students must complete their first 15 credits in Level I courses, which include:

- Transferable courses.
- Courses in IT, Computer
 Science, Anatomy &
 Physiology, foreign language.
- Courses that are part of a technical certificate.
- Courses that are part of a 15or 30-credit pathway.
- Courses in study skills, academic or career success.

Course Eligibility Rules



- Colleges must post their Level I courses – see website for details
- Once a student completes the First 15 credit hours in Level I, he or she can move to Level II courses, which are any other allowable college courses for which a student meets the prerequisites.

Course Eligibility Rules



Non-allowable courses include:

- Private applied courses with one-on-one instruction (such as music lessons)
- Courses with high fees
- Study abroad courses
- Physical education courses
- Pass/Fail graded courses
- Remedial courses or religious courses.

What are other requirement s?

Grades

- College Credit Plus grades
 earned in the college course is
 the same grade that will be on
 the high school transcript
- CCP course grades will be factored into the high school and college GPAs

What are other requirement s?

Grade Weighting

If a high school uses a weighted grading scale for Advanced Placement, International Baccalaureate, or Honors courses in a subject area, then College Credit Plus courses in the subject area will be weighted using the same scale

How many classes can students take?



Number of classes

Students may be enrolled in up to 30 semester credit hours per year, including high school courses:

30 – (secondary school units x 3) = max CCP credits

 The maximum number of credits allowable over the life of the program is 120

How many classes can students take?



If a student enrolls in more than 30 credit hours for the year, the school will discuss with the student whether to:

- Drop the course or
- Pay for the entire course (including tuition, fees, books) at the college's standard rates



Tests

- High School: Tests are sometimes given weekly or at the end of the chapter
- College: Tests are generally fewer in number and cover more material



Study Time

- High School: Required homework ranges between 1 to 3 hours per day
- College: Standard rule of 2 to 3 hours of homework for every hour spent in class (3 to 5 hours per day)



Knowledge Acquisition

- High School: Information provided mostly in-class. Out-ofclass research is minimal.
- College: Coursework will generally require more independent thinking, longer writing assignments, and out-ofclass research.



Grades

- High School: Numerous quizzes, tests, and homework assignments
- College: Few tests and fewer, if any, homework assignments will be used to determine final grades



Role of Parents

- High School: Parents are strong advocates working closely with teachers and counselors
- College: Parent serves as a mentor and support for the student; the college views the student as independent decisionmaker
- College: The Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) protects student education records

What are benefits of participating in College Credit Plus?

What are benefits of participating in College Credit Plus?



Students can:

- Earn high school and college credits at the same time
- Get a "head start" on college degrees or certificates
- Experience college early to understand the expectations of college life
- Save tuition and textbook costs

What are the cautions of College Credit Plus?

What are the consequences of underperforming?



- If students fail or withdraw too late from college courses, the district may require students/ families to repay the cost of tuition that the district had paid
- The grades that students earn will be on the students' college transcripts permanently

What are the consequences of underperforming?



- If students fail or withdraw often, future financial aid may be also impacted negatively [Contact the college's financial aid office for more information about Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP)]
- If students perform poorly, they may be placed CCP Probation, CCP Dismissal or on academic probation or dismissal by the college

Underperforming Student Rules



College Credit Plus Probation

 A student will be placed on CCP probation if he or she earns less than a cumulative 2.0 GPA in CCP courses or withdraws from 2 or more courses in one academic term.

While on CCP Probation, the student:

- May only enroll in one College Credit Plus course for one college term (semester or quarter).
- May not enroll in the college course in the same subject in which student previously earned D, F, NC grade (or equivalent).

Underperforming Student Rules



CCP Dismissal

- If students on CCP probation do not increase their CCP GPA to a 2.0 or above during the probation term, they will be placed on CCP Dismissal
- While on CCP Dismissal, students may not enroll in any College Credit Plus courses
- At the end of the dismissal term, the student can request (appeal) to be reinstated in the program

Underperforming Student Rules



CCP Appeal Process

- CCP Probation: a student may appeal in order to take a course in the same subject in which he or she previously earned a D, F, or received no credit.
- CCP Dismissal: Within 5 days of being dismissed, the student may submit an appeal to the secondary school to appeal CCP Dismissal.
- Each school must have a policy describing the process for appeals.

What are the expenses for College Credit Plus?



- At public colleges or universities, there will be no cost to the students/families for tuition, required fees, and books
- At private colleges or universities, students may be charged a small cost per credit hour
- Some optional expenses are the responsibility of the student/ family (Example: Parking and transportation)

What are support services are available for students?



- High school counselors continue to provide assistance to all College Credit Plus students
- College advisors provide course selection assistance
- Colleges must provide the same academic supports to College Credit Plus students as they do other students

What about athletic eligibility?



Student athletes should:

- Confirm their school is an Ohio High School Athletic Association (OHSAA) member
- 2. Learn the OHSAA requirements
- 3. Know that summer term CCP courses cannot be used to bring a student into compliance with the OHSAA requirements for interscholastic athletic participation

Will the course credits transfer?



- Certain general education and technical courses will transfer especially from one Ohio public college to another Ohio public college
- Students must check with colleges to confirm transferability
- Students should also visit <u>https://transfercredit.ohio.gov</u>
 for transfer information

What does being "college-ready" mean?



Being "college-ready" is more than just being academically ready

- Consider emotional and social transition and college expectations
- Consider time management & organizational skills

What are the deadlines?



April 1, 2020

 Students must complete and return the Intent to Participate form to the school office

Check ACT and SAT testing dates

Test early to meet college/university admission deadlines (if required)





College/Universities

- Check each college's deadline for admission
- Find out about assessment testing requirements
- Summer semester deadline will be early as classes usually start in May

BGSU CCP Admission Requirements



- Apply Online: www.bgsu.edu/applyccp
 - Application Deadlines:
 - Summer: April 15th
 - Fall: May 15th
 - Spring: November 15th
- High School cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher
- Must meet state testing eligibility score



Step 2: Satisfy CCP Eligibility & Admission

Submit transcripts & test scores to NC State

For admission into NC State, <u>student MUST MEET State of</u>
<u>Ohio's CCP Eligibility</u> Requirement in at least one tested area

NC State accepts Accuplacer and ACT scores

Accuplacer testing available on NC State's campus

Course Placement & Prerequisites must also be met*

 Student must meet with an advisor from NC State to plan courses

4. Orientation & Course Registration

CCP Orientation & Course Scheduling

- A.) CCP courses held at your high school?

 NC State works with MS/HS counselor to schedule courses
- B.) <u>Courses meeting online or at one of NC State's Campuses?</u>
 Student must attend CCP Orientation on NC State campus to register for courses

2020 Eligibility Requirements

- Complete 9+ hours of NC State credits through CCP or Career Tech
- > Achieve a minimum 2.75 cumulative GPA with HS & NC State
- Qualifying with Career Tech curriculum?
 Credits must be earned under a <u>current articulation agreement</u>
 with NC State
 - > Testing required to establish College-Readiness benchmark





Tuition Freedam s c h o l a r s h i p s

2020 Eligibility Requirements

- > Students must meet one of the following criteria to qualify
 - ACT Reading of 21 or Accuplacer Reading of 250
 - Qualify as a CCP student and earn 9 hours
 - If only using Career Tech credit, must have 3.0 GPA in both senior-level English and cumulative high school GPA

SCHOLARSHIPS

Students must meet all deadlines & enrollment criteria to earn scholarship:

- 1. General Application to NC State, and placement testing: Due by JUNE 5
- 2. Tuition Freedom Scholarship Application: Due by JUNE 5
- 3. Scholarship Acceptance Form: Due by JULY 6
- 4. FAFSA Deadline: Due by JULY 6
- 5. Financial aid supplemental paperwork: Due by **JULY 16**



- Students must meet the Remediation Free Guidelines of the State of Ohio based on ACT, SAT or Accuplacer
- All application materials need to be submitted into Ohio State before the student is able to take the Accuplacer at one of the Ohio State campuses

English Sub Score	English – 18	Writing -480	Writing/Writeplacer-263
Reading Sub Score	Reading – 22	Reading-480	Reading-250
Math Sub Score	Math - 22	Math - 530	Math-263

- Students can be admitted in some areas, but not all areas based on scores
 - If the student passes English and Reading, they'll be admitted for all nonmath courses
 - If the student passes Math only, they'll be admitted to take only math courses
 - Students can retake the Accuplacer once per semester or use ACT/SAT scores to change restrictions



College Credit Plus Information & Planning Guide

Terms

- College Credit Plus (CCP) —This program provides high school students the opportunity to be enrolled in both high school and college level course work at the same time.
- Dual Enrollment (DE) Dual Enrollment classes are CCP courses which allow college-level courses to be facilitated by Lexington High School faculty who meet College Credit Plus teaching requirements.

Advanced Placement Options at Lexington

- > AP Program (Advanced Placement)
 - > AP Biology
 - > AP Calculus
 - > AP Chemistry
 - > AP English Literature and Composition (11th)
 - > AP English Language and Composition (12th)
 - > AP US History
 - > AP US Government & Politics
 - > AP Physics 1
- > AP Exams
 - > May 2 week testing schedule
 - > Scores: 1-5
 - > Credit given to scores 3 (limited), 4, 5



- Register online at <u>www.actstudent.org</u>
- Test dates remaining this year:
 - April 4 (Register by February 28)
 - June 13 (Register by May 8)
- All JUNIORS will take the ACT (no cost) on February 25 as part of the testing requirements through the state of Ohio.



- □ Two Fee Waivers (during Junior/Senior year) per student Can Register online with Fee Waiver.
- Students view scores with no fee online.
- Real-time seat assignment
- Students own/control the release of test score by test date students should complete 4 free choices

Athletic Eligibility

- > Students need to be passing 5 courses (full or half credit courses).
- > When enrolled in CCP courses, eligibility is based on courses taken at Lexington and at college/university.
 - > 3 semester hours = 1 HS credit=2 Athletic Eligibility points.

Next steps...

- > Students/Parents must notify the school of intent to participate by April 1st (to Student Services).
 - Intent to Participate (not binding) form must be submitted yearly, but students currently in CCP will not need to re-apply to their college to continue.
- > Decide if CCP is a right fit for you
- Apply to the college(s) you would like to attend by their deadline.
 - Request your transcript be sent to the college along with any other forms needed
 - Have test scores sent to the college from ACT, if needed

Next steps...

- > Once accepted...
 - > make sure to follow the procedures outlined in emails/letters from college
 - ➤ Including any assessments or placement testing that may be required
- Attend orientation (if taking classes on college campus)
- > Schedule classes

Things to Keep in Mind

- CC+ allows for flexibility with graduation - College course counting toward HS grad. requirement; check with your Principal or Counselor first! Not every course will fit a requirement; eligibility and worst-case scenarios must be considered.
- Students need to allow for travel time between the college and high school when scheduling classes.
- > Students may not miss any part of a high school class in order to make it to a college class please schedule carefully.

- All books are the property of Lexington schools and need to be returned by the 5th day after a course has ended.
- Financial responsibility:
 Student's responsibility to pay
 for failed courses, or a class
 dropped after the drop period
 (14 calendar days after course
 begins).
