Information for the 2018-2019 School Year



College Credit Plus is Ohio's dual credit program

- Students earn high school and college credit at the same time
- Students enroll in college courses and adhere to the requirements of the college





Students in Grades 7 through 12:

- Must complete an assessment exam and be determined "eligible" or deemed as "college-ready" for College Credit Plus
- May apply to any public college or participating private college
- May apply to multiple institutions



Students in Grades 7 through 12:

- May choose from a variety of college-level courses (as determined by placement testing)
- Must be Ohio residents
- For students who have not lived in Ohio for 12 consecutive months (just transferring into Ohio from an Out-of-state high school) they must have a parent living and working full-time within the state of Ohio.





Students in Grades 7 through 12:

- Can earn credit to satisfy both high school and college requirements
 - 3+ Credit Hours = 1 High School Unit
- Must successfully complete the courses in order to earn the credit





Students in Grades 7 through 12:

- May take classes in the summer, fall, and spring semesters
- May take courses at the high school¹, college campus, or online

¹This option is available if the high school has partnered with a college or university to offer college courses at the high school

Step 2

- Students must submit college-ready assessment exam scores
- Assessment exam examples:

ACT, SAT, OR Accuplacer

Each college/university may have different exam requirements

At BGSU-Applicants Must Have A Cumulative GPA of 3.0 AND

ACT-Reading Score-22 OR

SAT-Reading Score 480 OR

Accuplacer-Reading Score 80



How can students participate?

If a student's assessment scores are not deemed "college-ready," other conditions may be considered depending on the *exam scores <u>AND</u> if the student has one of the following:

An Overall/Cumulative GPA of (3.0) <u>OR</u> Recommendation form/letter from one of the following: School Counselor, Principal, or Career-Tech Advisor

What does being "college-ready" mean?

Being "college-ready" is more than just being academically ready

- Consider emotional and social transition and college expectations
- Consider time management & organizational skills
- Are you the type of student who needs more instructional time?
- Are you the type of student who is motivated by academics and achievement?
- Does the student have a passion for learning?



What courses can a student take?

 If taking college classes on-campus or on-line, an assigned College Advisor will help students choose which courses they can take and teach them how to register for classes.

Based on test assessment scores

Based on course prerequisites

 If taking college classes offered at the high school, the School Counselor will send a course roster and an assigned advisor will complete the registration process for the students.

What courses can a student take?

Courses can satisfy high school graduation requirements

School Counselors can help students understand requirements and course substitutions

- Schools might have additional requirements in addition to the state minimum such as a Senior Capstone or Senior Service-Project
- Courses must be college-level or non-remedial
- Courses must be nonreligious
- Students may take courses in subject areas that are not offered at high school as elective choices as long as they don't have undergraduate program entrance requirements or prerequisites

CollegeCredit PLUS

Grades

- College Credit Plus grades earned in the college course is the same grade that will be on the high school transcript
- Grades will be factored into the high school and college GPA
- If a high school uses a weighted grading scale for Advanced Placement, International Baccalaureate, or Honors courses in a subject area,

-then College Credit Plus courses in the subject area will be weighted using the same scale

Students must complete End of Course exams for English, Math, and Science

-School Counselors can inform students which college courses will exempt them from End of Course exams in other subject areas

CollegeCredit

How many classes can students take?

ONLY 30 COLLEGE CREDITS CAN BE TAKEN EACH ACADEMIC YEAR THROUGH CCP: <u>Formula</u>: # of High School courses x3 and subtract that number from 30

Example:

Student is enrolled for 3 secondary units at high school that include:

Band (1), Spanish (1), Chemistry (1)

3 HS Courses X (3)=9

30-9=21

Student is eligible to take 21 college credit hours during the current academic year

(Summer, Fall, Spring)



How many classes can students take?

- The maximum number of college credits allowable during the program is 120
- Graduating seniors cannot take courses in the summer through CCP
- If a student enrolls in more than 30 credit hours in an academic year:

School will discuss with the student whether to:

- 1. Drop the course or
- 2. Pay for the entire course

If a student enrolls in more than 30 credit hours and PAYS for the course:

Student/family will assume the cost of course credits and books at the college's standard rates

What are differences between high school and college?

Tests:

- High School: Tests are sometimes given weekly or at the end of the chapter
- College: Tests are generally fewer in number covering more material

Study Time:

- High School: Required homework ranges between 1 to 3 hours per day
- College: Standard rule of 2 to 3 hours of homework for every hour spent in class (3 to 5 hours per day)

Knowledge Acquisition:

- High School: Information provided mostly in-class. Out-of-class research is minimal.
- College: Coursework will generally require more independent thinking, longer writing assignments, and out-of-class research

Other differences between high school and college?

Parent Role:

- High School: Parents are strong advocates working closely with teachers and counselors
- College: Parent serves as a mentor and support for the student; the college views the student as independent decision-maker

The Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) protects student education records

What are the benefits of participating?

- Students can earn high school and college credits at the same time
- Students can get a "head start" on college degrees or certificates
- Students can experience college early to understand the expectations of college life
- Students can save tuition and textbook costs-BGSU also waives parking pass fee
- Students can take courses that are not offered at the high school such as Music, Philosophy, Theater, or Advanced History/Language
- Students can experience diversity by exposure to students of different ages, backgrounds, and beliefs
- Students can get involved on campus, attend athletic events, or use the Recreation Center



Other benefits include support services for students

- College advisors provide course selection assistance
- Students can learn more about college degree requirements and how the classes they are taking apply to the degree check sheets
- Tutoring is free and includes almost all subject areas
- Students can utilize Career Services Office for help with creating resume or looking for internships
- Students with IEP's-Accessibility Services



What are the cautions to be aware of?

- Leaving the high school can be a major social adjustment
- Transportation and separate academic calendars
- Time-management can be difficult
- If students fail or withdraw too late from a college course, the district may seek reimbursement for the tuition costs from the student/family
- The grades that students earn are on the college transcript forever
- If students perform poorly, they may be placed on academic probation or dismissal by the college
- If students fail or withdraw often, future financial aid may be impacted negatively



More cautions to be aware of?

- On-Line Courses demand much more self-discipline and time-management skills
- Students must take notes in class during lecture time
- More time spent on reading, discussion in class, and critical thinking
- Group work can be difficult
- Very little time for socializing with friends
- Coursework is geared toward adult-learners and the idea of academic freedom
- Academic progress reporting is the responsibility of the student
- Grades earned in college courses get calculated into the high school GPA
- Student must check e-mail daily and Canvas account



What about athletic eligibility?

Student athletes should:

- 1. Confirm their school is an Ohio High School Athletic Association (OHSAA) member
- 2. Learn the OHSAA requirements
- 3. Know that summer term CCP courses <u>may not</u> be used to bring a student into compliance with the OHSAA requirements for interscholastic athletic participation
- 4. If required, obtain grade progress report from college instructor



What are the deadlines?

By April 1, 2018

- Students must complete the high school Intent To Participate form and return to the school –MY ADVICE-TURN IT IN TONIGHT!!!
- Check ACT and SAT dates
- Test early to meet college/university admission deadlines (if required)
- Check each college's deadline for admission
- Find out about assessment testing requirements
- Summer semester deadline will be early as classes usually start in May



Will the course credits transfer?

- Certain general education and technical courses will transfer especially from one public college to another public college- private colleges may not take the credit-students are encouraged to do their "homework" and find out as they go through the Admissions process
- Students have the responsibility to check with colleges to confirm transferability and make sure they order their college transcripts when they finish CCP
- Students should check <u>https://transfercredit.ohio.gov/</u>for transfer info



What Courses can I take at OSU Mansfield?

- Students can take <u>any</u> courses as long as they meet the prerequisites
- Online Classes are highly selective and competitive
- Students who are admitted to the Academy attend an Orientation
- There they will meet their advisor & schedule classes
- Course enrollment may be limited due to departments prerequisites
- Course enrollment may be limited due to seats available
- Students pursuing their Ohio State degree are offered priority scheduling before academy students
- Course Content is not changed





- 1. At Partner high school
 - Taught by approved HS faculty
 - Meets within the school day; on your school's term calendar

2. At NC State College

- Taught by NCSC faculty on the NCSC term
 - Mansfield Main Campus

 - Bucyrus Crawford Success Center

3. Online

- Taught by NCSC faculty on the NCSC term
- Courses taught either 100% online or in a hybrid delivery

Which format is right for you?

- 1. At Partner high school
 - No travel; in class with HS peers
 - No interference with school activities or work
 - To schedule, meet with your school counselor

2. At NC State College

- Travel is student responsibility; in class with adults
- Instructors *not* required to excuse you for school functions
- To schedule, meet with NCSC and attend orientation

3. Online

- Need strong time management & self-motivation; independ
- Requires reliable computer and internet access
- To schedule, meet with NCSC and attend orientation

CCP with NCSC: *Where do I start?*

1. By April 1 each year <u>NEW and CONTINUING</u> <u>Students</u> submit Intent to Participate form

- Public school students: Submit to your counselor
- Nonpublic & Homeschool students: 1. Submit to Ohio Dept. of Ed (form available at <u>www.ohiohighered.org/ccp</u>)
 - 2. Create SAFE account to annually apply for CCP funding
 - 3. Provide CCP funding letter to the college

2018-19 Application Deadlines: Summer Semester: April 1 Fall Semester: May 1 Spring Semester: November 1

Once admitted, how do I register for class?

For courses at the High • Register with your School Counselor School • 1. Schedule your 1:1 academic advising @ NCSC For courses at NCSC or 2. Attend CCP Orientation @ NCSC for class online* registration

*The last CCP orientation will be offered approximately 30 days prior to the semester. All new students required to attend orientation, must do so. Failure to complete these requirements will result in being delayed until the next semester to schedule classes.

Summer Semester 2018: May 29 Fall Semester 2018: Aug 20 Spring Semester 2019: Jan 14





North Central State College <u>will provide</u> up to an Associate Degree, or a maximum of 64 credit hours, <u>tuition free</u> to each qualifying College Credit Plus or Career Tech student from a partner secondary school.

*The TFS Scholarship *will <u>not</u> cover fees* beyond general tuition *or textbooks*.





S C H O L A R S H I P S 2018 Eligibility Requirements

For Class of 2018 (current Seniors)

- Complete at least <u>6</u> hours of NCSC credits while in CCP
- > Achieve a 2.75 Grade Point Average (GPA) in all college coursework

Qualifying with Career Tech curriculum?

Credits must be earned under a <u>current</u> articulation agreement with NCSC

> Required: Test to establish College-Readiness benchmark

(ACT Reading 21, or equivalent on COMPASS or ACCUPLACER)

Required: High school GPA of 2.75





S C H O L A R S H I P S 2018 Eligibility Requirements

For Class of 2019 (current Juniors)

- > Complete at least <u>9</u> hours of NCSC credits through CCP
- > Achieve a 2.75 Grade Point Average (GPA) in all college coursework

> Qualifying with Career Tech curriculum?

Credits must be earned under a <u>current articulation</u> agreement with NCSC

- Required: Test to establish College-Readiness benchmark (ACT Reading 21, or equivalent on COMPASS or ACCUPLACER)
- Required: High school GPA of 2.75



- 2. TFS Scholarship Application: June 1, 2018 (online)
- 3. Scholarship Acceptance Form: July 1, 2018 (mail)
- 4. FAFSA: July 5, 2018; All follow up FA paperwork: July 19, 2018

AU CCP ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

- Participation in college preparatory curricula and completion of the following:
 - Two or more units of high school English
 - Two or more units of high school math (algebra or higher)
 - Two or more units of high school science (one must be a laboratory science)
 - Two or more units of high school social studies
- 2 A cumulative grade point average of at least 2.50 on a 4.00 scale at the time student applies.
- **3 Student must have a composite score of 18 or higher on the ACT.** (An English subscore of 21 is required to take English 101 or higher.)
- 4 Student must complete the free online application for admission into CCP program available at www.ashland.edu/apply.
- 5 Student must complete and submit all approval forms required by their high school.

These guidelines, under special circumstances, may be evaluated on an individual basis with additional advisement of the high school guidance counselor. Registration is limited to a maximum of 16 credit hours per semester, and 30 credit hours per year. All criteria are subject to review every year based on student academic success.

HOW TO PARTICIPATE

NOTIFY

Meet with your guidance counselor and submit the "Intent to Participate" form by April 1.

APPLY

Apply online (deadline for fall semester 2018 is June 1st).

Application is free: www.ashland.edu/admissions/apply-now

SCHEDULE

After acceptance, attend a May group info meeting on main campus. Be sure to R.S.V.P. for a fall orientation session (held in August).

Private colleges and universities do not receive state funding, and as such, are not required to participate. **Courses taken at the AU campus are \$33 per credit hour**, an exceptional savings when compared to the current regular part-time undergraduate tuition rate of \$913/hour.



SAVINGS

- Any CCP tuition will be applied toward your first semester undergraduate tuition.
- Students who qualify for the free and reduced lunch program do not pay tuition fees.
- Ashland University waives any extra fees in addition to tuition.
- The high school pays for the cost of textbooks.
- Responsibility for transportation rests with the student.

COLLEGE CREDIT PLUS (CCP)



Athletic Eligibility

- Students need to be passing 5 courses (full or half credit courses).
- When enrolled in CCP courses, eligibility is based on courses taken at Lexington and at college/university.
 3 semester hours = 1 HS credit=2 Athletic Eligibility points.

- > AP Biology
- > AP Calculus

- > Scores: 1-5
 - Credit given to scores 3 (limited), 4, 5

College Credit Plus Information & Planning Guide

<u>Terms</u>

- College Credit Plus (CCP) This program provides high school students the opportunity to be enrolled in both high school and college level course work at the same time.
- Dual Enrollment (DE) Dual Enrollment classes are CCP courses which allow college-level courses to be facilitated by Lexington High School faculty who meet College Credit Plus teaching requirements.

Next steps...

- Students/Parents must notify the school of intent to participate by April 1st (to Student Services).
 - Intent to Participate form must be submitted yearly, but students currently in CCP will not need to re-apply to their college to continue.
- > Decide if CCP is a right fit for you
- > Apply to the college(s) you would like to attend by their deadline.
 - Request your transcript be sent to the college along with any other forms needed
 - Have test scores sent to the college from ACT, if needed
- > Once accepted, make sure to follow the procedures outlined in emails/letters
- > Attend orientation
- > Schedule classes

Things to Keep in Mind

- CC+ allows for flexibility with graduation – College course counting toward HS grad. requirement; check with your Principal or Counselor first! Not every course will fit a requirement; eligibility and worst-case scenarios must be considered.
- Students need to allow for travel time between the college and high school when scheduling classes.
- Students may not miss any part of a high school class in order to make it to a college class – please schedule carefully.

- All books are the property of Lexington schools and need to be returned by the 5th day after a course has ended.
- Financial responsibility: Student's responsibility to pay for failed courses, or a class dropped after the drop period (14 calendar days after course begins).
